Many readers don't notice that a "story" they're reading is part of a larger work, even when it's within a publication. Readers may jump into a featured "story" without realizing the rest of the book isn't available or is scattered across Medium. This fragmentation makes it crucial to release material in a sequential order using the "follow" mechanism and an introduction that explains the book's structure. Once the whole book is published, this workaround becomes less effective. To address this issue, I've started using the "hidden" story attribute to make sequences of articles only accessible in order by linking earlier parts to later ones. The downside is that unlisted stories are unavailable for generating income. However, I found it useful to include a standard footer image that provides the same function, making it easier for readers to navigate back to the homepage after enjoying an article. When breaking down sections into smaller "stories," I add a notification below the main image to indicate that it's part of a sequence of stories. I use the term "sequence" because Medium uses "series" to describe a different type of open-ended series. Unfortunately, adding this notification as title/subtitle or standard text was limiting, and I wanted something that stood out but didn't overshadow the text. My solution was to create a font size and style similar to image attribution, using a non-visible 1-pixel transparent gif with hyperlinked text linking back to the table of contents. Navigation was another challenge, as each publication's homepage had a limited navigation bar restricted to top-level sections or featured stories pages. To overcome this, I reproduced the publication's navigation bar near the top of every story page in my book, placing it above the start of the text underneath the title. You can't always get the full URL of a story to work in Medium apps. Instead, you have to use a short unique identifier to create a table of contents. Here's how I do it: I create a new story without tags and images that will serve as a table of contents for a section of my book. The title is the section name or sequence of stories. The subtitle is "Table of Contents". Then, I add hyperlinked titles and optional descriptions. This story should be unlisted so it doesn't appear on my profile and untagged so it doesn't show up in searches. However, some users might want to make their table of contents discoverable. To create a short URL, you look at the original URL in a browser and copy the identifier, which is 12 numbers and letters (a hexadecimal number). You can then append this identifier to create a new URL for your table of contents. When I do this, my "About" story's URL looks like this: The unique identifier appears just before the question mark in the link. Alternatively, you can edit a story before publishing it and use a slightly different URL. You can then copy the initial URL and truncate the suffix to get the short URL form directly. To add hyperlinks between articles, you need to create another linked attribution line at the end of each article before footnotes. To navigate back through pages on Medium apps, tap the left angle bracket in the top-left corner repeatedly. This will gradually take you back to previous pages. However, this isn't as seamless as mobile app navigation and requires manual tracking of your progress. In contrast, clicking on links in the browser opens a new page for each story, which can be cumbersome. To mitigate this, you can configure the browser to open new tabs instead of windows, but this still doesn't allow for automated tracking of your journey through the book. Instead, you'll need to manually switch between previous stories or menus. Medium apps offer convenient features like bookmarking and archiving stories for later reading, making it easier to navigate long publications. Interestingly, our publication has seen a significant surge in followers and daily visitors, exceeding my initial expectations. However, this rapid growth also presents a challenge: Medium's limit on daily story submissions can lead to account lockouts if exceeded. To avoid this issue, consider scheduling your stories for publication using the built-in function, ensuring a smooth and orderly release of content without surpassing the platform's limits.
